1. ENVIRONMENTAL MANAGEMENT BONDS
\$34,000,000
 (CHAPTER 55 - PUBLIC LAWS 2000)

Approval of this question will authorize the State of Rhode Island to issue general obligation bonds and refunding bonds in an amount not to exceed \$34,000,000 for environmental and recreational purposes, specifically, the acquisition of open space for preservation and ground water protection and the development of public recreational facilities.

2. RHODE ISLAND CLEAN WATER FINANCE AGENCY - WATER QUALITY MANAGEMENT BONDS
\$60,000,000
 (CHAPTER 55 - PUBLIC LAWS 2000)

Approval of this question will authorize the State of Rhode Island to issue general obligation bonds and refunding bonds in an amount not to exceed \$60,000,000 to provide funding for the Rhode Island Clean Water Finance Agency which will be leveraged with federal and state capitalization grants to provide loans at a subsidized rate of zero percent to municipalities, governmental entities and non-governmental entities for the construction, repair, equipping and upgrading of water pollution abatement projects including, but not limited to, wastewater treatment facilities, nutrient reduction, sewers, combined sewer overflow systems, restoration of aquatic habitats, and stormwater treatment and to provide subsidized interest rate loans to community water systems, both privately and publicly owned, and non-profit non-community water systems for drinking water projects.
